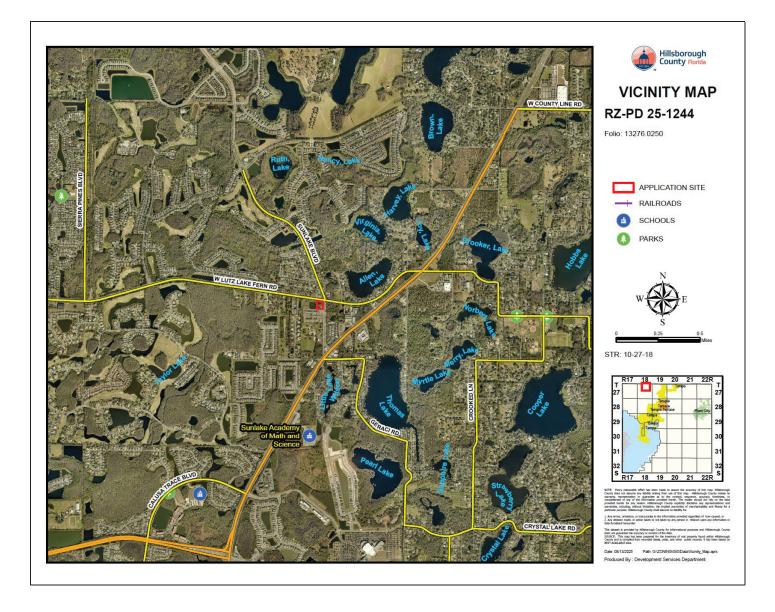

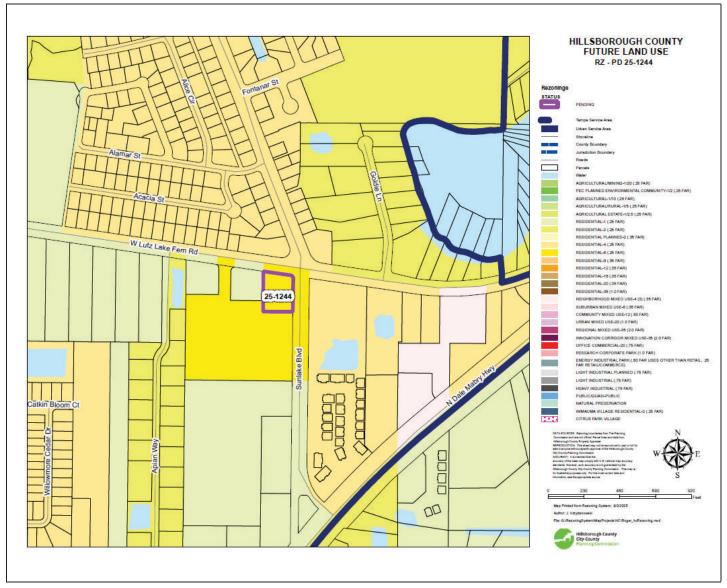
2.1 Vicinity Map

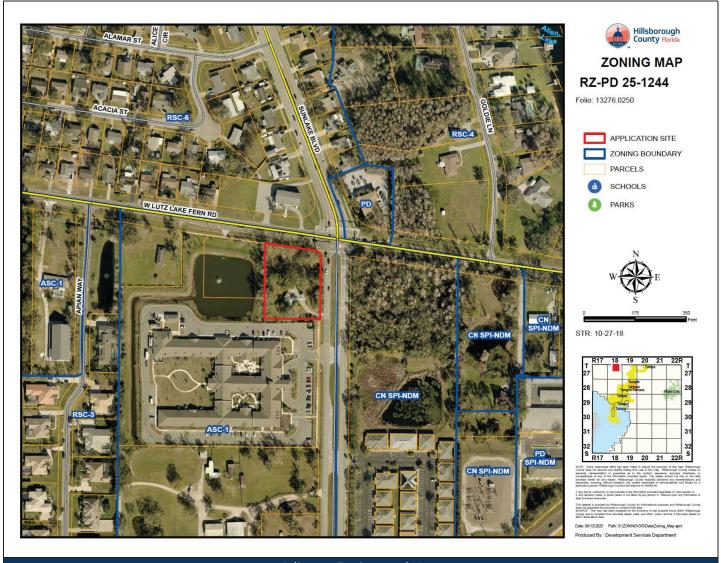

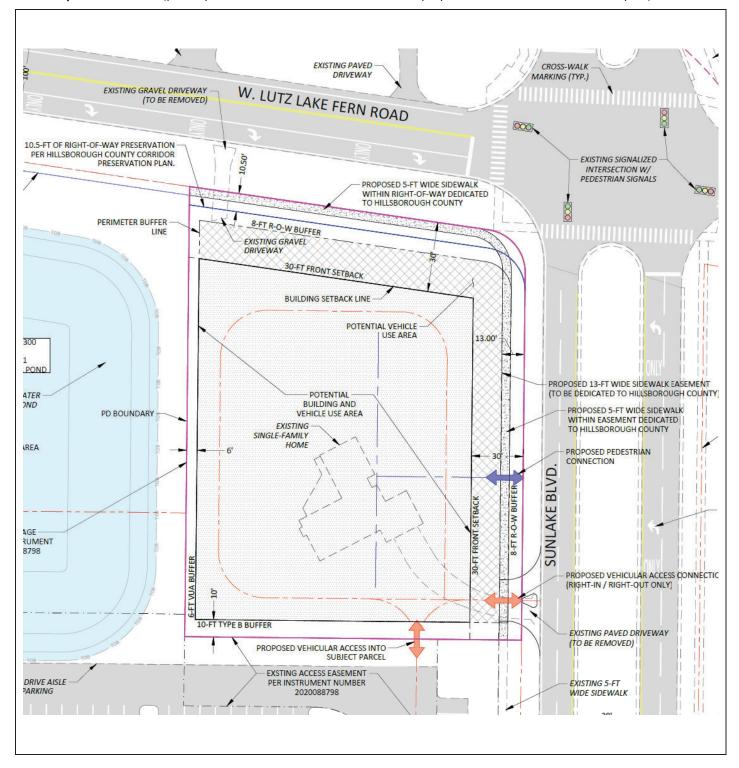

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5.0 IMPLEMENTATION RECOMMENDATIONS

5.1 Compatibility

The proposed Planned Development is located on the southwestern corner of the W. Lutz Lake Fern Road and Sunlake Boulevard intersection just north of N Dale Mabry Highway. The property is surrounded by a mixture of uses that include residential lots, a nursing home, an office parks, a membership organization, and a farm.

Staff find the addition of a commercial site of this size will be compatible with the surrounding area. The parcel is adjacent to a stormwater pond to the east that serves the nursing, convalescent and extended care facility bordering the southern property line. The applicant is requesting reductions in the buffering and screening to the south and east though due to the nature of the existing use and the stormwater pond staff does not feel the reduction will cause harm in the privacy and separation of the buildings. Furthermore, the building will be further separated from the southern and eastern property lines by the nursing facility's parking area and the parking area that will service the new development.

5.2 Recommendation

Approvable, subject to proposed conditions.

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6.0 PROPOSED CONDITIONS

Approval - Approval of the request, subject to the conditions listed below, is based on the general site plan submitted October 28, 2025.

1. The project shall be limited to the following use and FAR calculations:

- 3. Buffering and screening shall be provided as shown on the PD site plan.
- 4. Should the site be located within the Wellhead Resource Protection Area, certain uses may be restricted, prohibited, or require additional permitting when applicable.
- 5. Natural Resources staff identified a number of significant trees on the site including potential Grand Oaks. The site plan may be modified from the Certified Site Plan to avoid tree removal.
- 6. Approval of this petition by Hillsborough County does not constitute a guarantee that Natural Resources approvals/permits necessary for the development as proposed will be issued, does not itself serve to justify any impacts to trees, natural plant communities or wildlife habitat, and does not grant any implied or vested right to environmental approvals.

References to development standards of the LDC in the above stated conditions shall be interpreted as the regulations in effect at the time of preliminary site plan/plat approval.

^{*} The uses may be constructed individually or as a mix of uses, so long as the development total does not exceed the maximum .25 FAR and the trip generation cap.

The construction and location of any proposed wetland impacts are not approved by this correspondence but shall be reviewed by EPC staff under separate application pursuant to the EPC Wetlands rule detailed in Chapter 1-11, Rules of the EPC, (Chapter 1-11) to determine whether such impacts are necessary to accomplish reasonable use of the subject property.
- 11. Prior to the issuance of any building or land alteration permits or other development, the approved wetland /other surface water (OSW) line must be incorporated into the site plan. The wetland/OSW line must appear on all site plans, labeled accordingly.
- 12. Final design of buildings, stormwater retention areas, and ingress/egresses are subject to change pending formal agency jurisdictional determinations of wetland and other surface water boundaries and approval by the appropriate regulatory agencies.
- 13. The subject site shall be permitted a right-in/right-out access connection onto Sunlake Blvd. and an additional access connection through the adjacent parcel under Folio No. 13276.0260 along the project's southern boundary.
- 14. All construction ingress and egress shall be limited to the Sunlake Blvd. project access. The developer shall include a note in each site/construction plan submittal which indicates the same.
- 15. Notwithstanding anything herein or shown on the PD site plan to the contrary, bicycle and pedestrian access may be permitted anywhere along PD boundaries.
- 16. Nowthingstanding anything shown in the PD site plan or therein the conditions of approval, the applicant shall provide internal sidewalks connections to the project site arrival point, the primary building entrances, parking, and any other onsite amenities consistent with 06.03.02 of the Land Development Code.
- 17. No development shall be permitted that causes cumulative development to exceed 657 gross average daily trips, 43 gross a.m. peak hour trips, or 89 gross p.m. peak hour trips.
 - a. Concurrent with each increment of development, the developer shall provide a list of existing and previously approved uses within the PD. The list shall contain data including gross floor area, number of seats (if applicable), type of use, date the use was approved by Hillsborough County, references to the site subdivision Project Identification number (or if no Project Identification number exists, a copy of the permit or other official reference number), calculations detailing the individual and cumulative gross and net trip generation impacts for that increment of the development, and source for the data used to develop such estimates. Calculations showing the remaining number of trips available remaining for each analysis period (i.e. average daily, a.m. peak and p.m. peak) shall also be provided.
- 18. Concurrent with each increment of development, the developer shall submit a trip generation and site access analysis which analyzes total project trips and shall be used to determine whether turn lanes are required pursuant to Sec. 06.04.04.D. This may require the developer to preserve, dedicate and convey or otherwise acquire additional right-of way where necessary to construct required turn lanes. Inability to construct or

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otherwise accommodate required turn lanes may result in the developer being unable to construct to its maximum entitlement.

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- 19. If PD 25-1244 is approved, the County Engineer will approve a Section 06.04.02.B. Administrative Variance (dated and submitted on September 29th, 2025) from the Hillsborough County Land Development Code (LDC) Section 06.04.07 access spacing requirements, which was found approvable on November 7th, 2025. Approval of this Administrative Variance will permit a reduction of the minimum access spacing for the projects Sunlake Blvd. connection as follows:
 - a. A variance of +/- 130ft from the project's driveway to the closest access to the south (on the west side of the road), resulting in an access spacing of +/- 115ft.
- 20. If PD 25-1244 is approved, the County Engineer will approve a Section 06.04.02.B. Administrative Variance (dated and submitted on September 29th, 2025) to meet the requirements of the Hillsborough County Land Development Code (LDC) Section 06.04.03.L, which was found approvable on November 7th, 2025. Approval of this Administrative Variance will waive the substandard roadway improvements on Sunlake Blvd. in association with the proposed development.
- 21. In accordance with LDC Section 5.03.07.C, the certified PD general site plan shall expire for the internal transportation network and external access points, as well as for any conditions related to the internal transportation network and external access points, if site construction plans, or equivalent thereof, have not been approved for all or part of the subject Planned Development within 5 years of the effective date of the PD unless an extension is granted as provided in the LDC. Upon expiration, re-certification of the PD General Site Plan shall be required in accordance with provisions set forth in LDC Section 5.03.07.C

The proposed use is adjacent to a Nursing Home to the west and south. A 20-foot wide buffer with Type B screening is required per Code.

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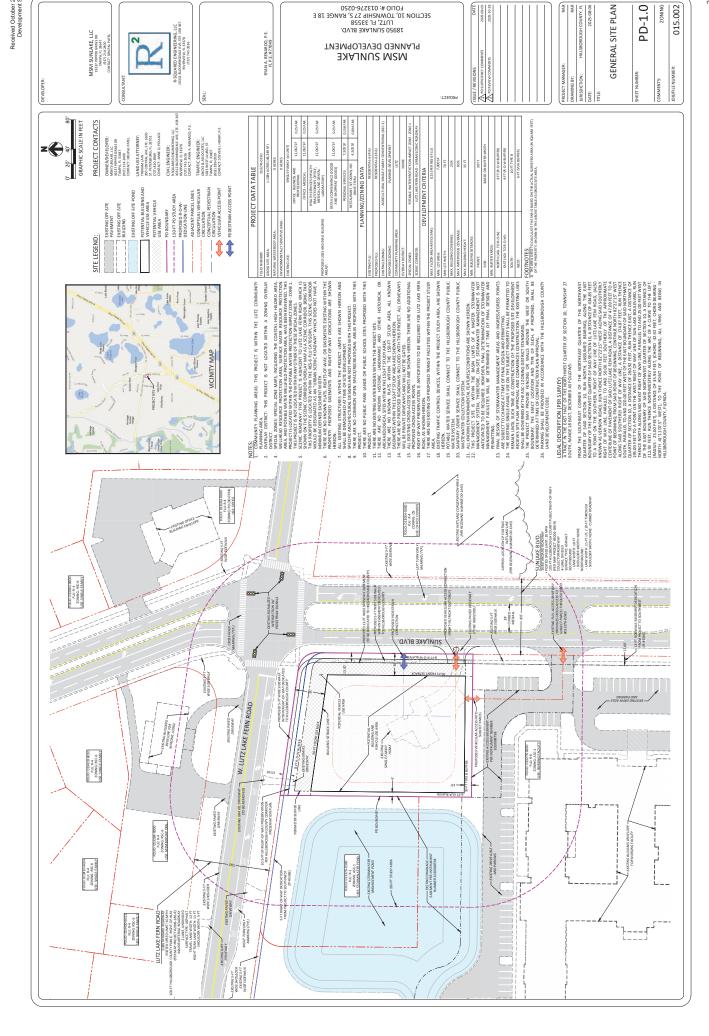

The subject site is located adjacent to the facility's northeast parking area.

The applicant is requesting to rezone one parcel totaling +/- 1.11 acres from Agricultural Single Family Conventional – 1 (ASC-1) to Planned Development (PD). The proposed Planned Development is seeking approval for a mix of the following uses at a density that does not exceed the maximum permitted FAR: Business Professional Office, Health Practitioners Office, Retail Convenience Goods and Shoppers Goods, Personal Services, and Eating Establishment without Drive-through - Sit Down Only (i.e. no Fast Food Restaurants with or without drive-through are permitted). The site is located on the south-western corner of the intersection of Sunlake Blvd. and W. Lutz Lake Fern Rd. The Future Land Use designation of the site is R-6.

Trip Generation Analysis

Consistent with DRPM requirements, the applicant did submit a trip generation and site access analysis: however, staff notes that this analysis does not accurately reflect the infinite combination of possible uses and densities proposed with this application and therefore does not represent a worst-case scenario. Given this, and the sensitivity of the access and proximity to adjacent driveways, staff has included a condition restricting development to the number of trips studied in the applicant's transportation analysis. As such, certain allowable single uses or combinations of allowable uses could be limited if they exceeded the trip cap.

It should be noted that at the time of plat/site/construction plan review, when calculating the trip generation impacts of existing and proposed development, authority to determine the appropriateness of certain Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE) land use codes shall rest with the Administrator, who shall consult ITE land use code definitions, trip generation datasets, and industry best practices to determine whether use of an individual land use code is appropriate. Trip generation impacts for all existing and proposed uses shall be calculated utilizing the latest available ITE trip generation manual data when possible. At the request of staff, applicants may be required to conduct additional studies or research where a lack of accurate or appropriate data exists to determine generation rates for purposes of calculating whether a proposed increment of development exceeds the trip cap.

It should also be noted that while the trip cap will control the total number of trips within each analysis period (daily, a.m. peak, and p.m. peak), it was developed based on certain land uses assumed by the developer, and those land uses have a specific percentage split of trips within each peak period that are inbound and outbound trips, and those splits may or may not be similar to the

inbound/outbound split of what uses are ultimately constructed by the developer. Staff notes that the trip cap does not provide for such granularity.

Lastly, as discussed with the applicant prior to the filing of this report and stated in the conditions of approval, the developer will be required to provide a trip generation and site access analysis studying the project in its entirety at the time of site construction to determine whether site access improvements will be required. The developer will be required to construct all such site access improvements found to be warranted unless otherwise approved through the Administrative Variance process outlined in Section 6.04.02.B.

Staff have prepared a comparison of the potential number of trips generated under the existing zoning designation and the traffic generation provided in the traffic analysis prepared by the developer. Data presented below is based on the Institute of Transportation Engineer's Trip Generation Manual, 12th Edition.

TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE SERVING THE SITE

The site has frontage on W. Lutz Lake Fern Rd. and Sunlake Blvd.

W. Lutz Lake Fern Rd. is a 2-lane, undivided, substandard county maintained, rural arterial roadway. The roadway is characterized by +/- 12-foot travel lanes. There are +/- 3-foot-wide paved shoulders on both sides of the roadway and no sidewalks along the roadway in the vicinity of the

project. The roadway lies within a +/- 100-foot-wide right-of-way. Pursuant to the Hillsborough County Preservation Plan W. Lutz Lake Fern Rd. is designated for a future four lane enhancement. In accordance with the standards outlined in Typical Section – 6 (TS-6) of the Hillsborough County Transportation Technical Manuel (TTM) and as displayed on the site plan, +/- 10.5ft along the subject site's northern frontage abutting W. Lutz Lake Fern Rd. is being preserved to accommodate this future expansion.

Sunlake Rd. is a 4-lane, divided, substandard county-maintained, urban collector roadway. The roadway is characterized by +/- 10-foot travel lanes. There are no bike lanes within the vicinity of the project and +/- 5-foot-wide sidewalks along the eastern side and portions of the western side of the roadway within the vicinity of the project. The roadway lies within a +/- 105-foot-wide right-of-way.

ADMINISTRATIVE VARANCE - SUNLAKE BLVD ACCESS SPACING

The applicant's Engineer of Record (EOR) has submitted a Section 6.04.02.B. Administrative Variance Request (dated and submitted September 29th, 2025) from the Section 6.04.07 LDC requirement governing spacing for the proposed Sunlake Blvd. access. In accordance with this section of the LDC, Sunlake Blvd. has been identified as a Class 5 roadway with a posted speed limit of 45MPH. As such, the minimum connection spacing is 245ft. The applicant is proposing the driveway in a location which is +/- 115ft from the adjacent driveway to the south. As such, the applicant is seeking a variance of 130ft. Based on factors presented in the Administrative Variance Request, the County Engineer found the request approvable on November 7th, 2025.

If this rezoning is approved by the BOCC, the County Engineer will approve the above referenced Administrative Variance Request.

ADMINISTRATIVE VARANCE – SUNLAKE BLVD SUBSTANDARD ROADWAY

As Sunlake Blvd. has been identified as a substandard roadway, the applicant's Engineer of Record (EOR) has submitted a Section 6.04.02.B Administrative Variance Request (dated and submitted September 29th, 2025) which was found approvable by the County Engineer (on November 7th, 2025) for the Sunlake Blvd. substandard road improvements. Approval of this

Administrative Variance will waive the substandard road improvements required by Section 06.04.03.L of the LDC.

If this rezoning is approved by the BOCC, the County Engineer will approve the above referenced Administrative Variance Request.

SITE ACCESS

The subject site currently takes access onto Sunlake Blvd. via a single right-in right-out access connection. In addition to the existing access, which is proposed to remain, an additional access connection connecting through the parking lot of the adjacent parcel to the south under Folio No. 13276.0260 is proposed.

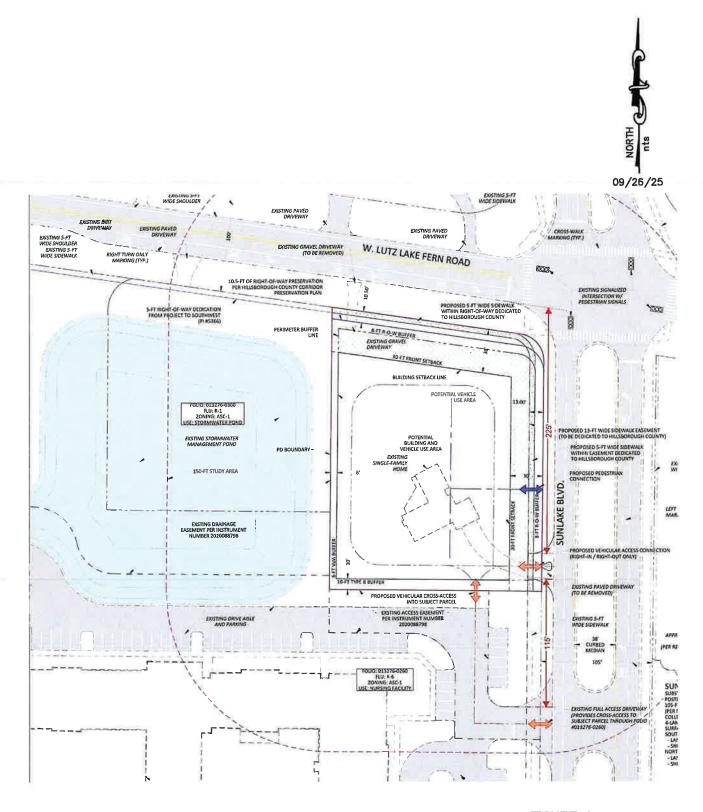

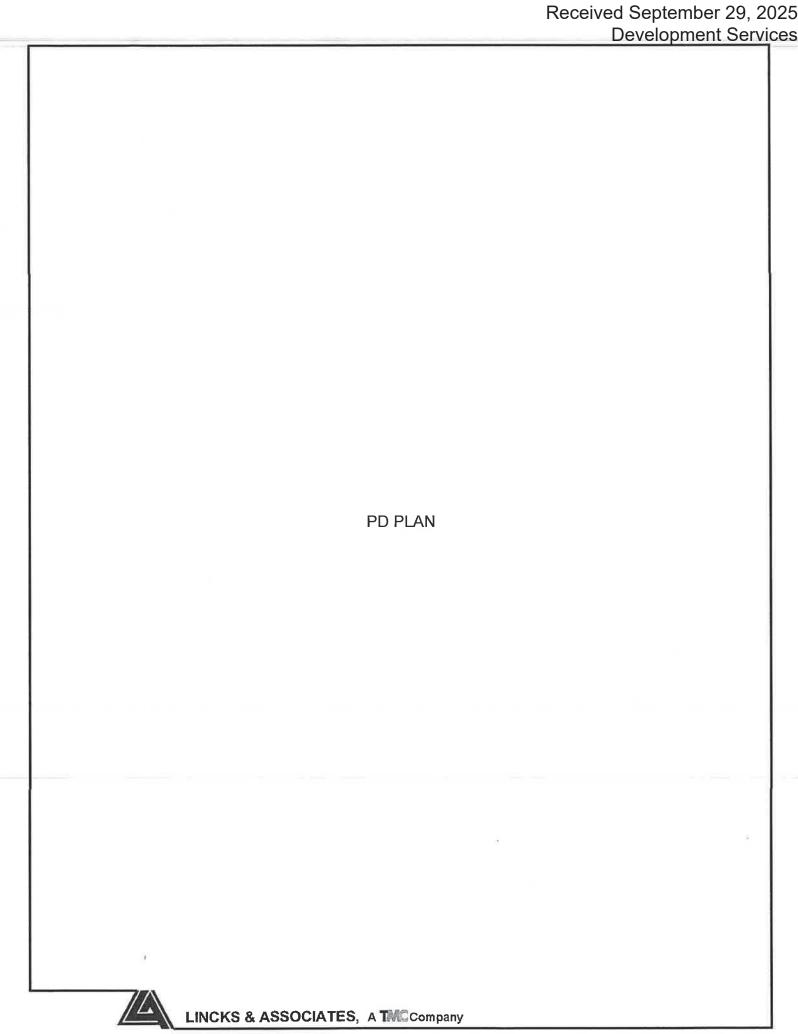
(b) the variance would not be detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare,

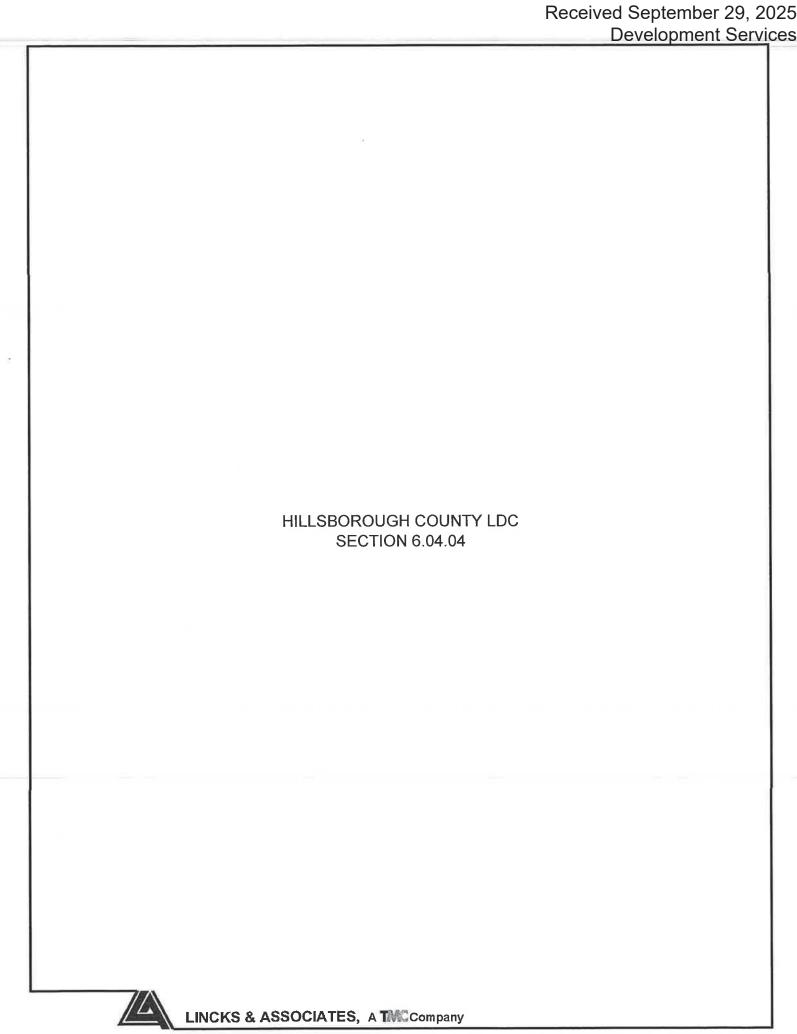

Sec. 6.04.04. - Design Standards

A. Driveway Width/Length

Driveways provide the physical transition between a site and the abutting roadway. Driveways should be located and designed to minimize impacts on traffic while providing safe entry and exit from the development served. The location and design of the connection must take into account characteristics of the roadway, the site, and the potential users.

The actual width and length of driveways shall be subject to internal and external traffic flow considerations. The driveway width considerations include, but are not limited to the number of lanes, the driveway geometrics, internal obstructions, traffic safety, etc. The length of driveways shall be designed to provide for an uninterrupted traffic flow on the public street. This will require that the entering vehicles not be confronted with maneuvering vehicles at the immediate point of entry, thus requiring other entering vehicle(s) to stop in the through traffic flow. The driveway length therefore, will be subject to the anticipated required stacking length of entering and exiting vehicle during the peak period.

- 1. For driveways that will be signalized, driveway length should be determined by a traffic study of expected traffic and queues.

 An important measurement in determining the driveway length is the outbound queue.
- 2. For unsignalized driveways, the following minimum lengths will be used:

Land Use	Driveway Length (In Feet)
Any major entrance with 4 or more total lanes in the in the driveway. Typically malls, and "Super" retail centers	300 or greater, based on

Regional Shopping Centers (over 150,000 sq. ft.)	250

3. For residential developments, the maximum length shall be:

B. Driveway Grades

- 1. Driveway grades shall conform to the requirements of FDOT Roadway and Traffic Design Standard Indices, latest edition.
- 2. For driveways with high volumes and where curve radii turnouts would be a prime benefit to traffic movements, the following factors should be considered:
 - a. It is desirable to have driveway slope upward from gutter line without any vertical curve. The upward slope with curbs will allow better control of drainage.

- b. It is desirable to have a relatively flat area adjacent to the roadway, where vehicles may turn off without an immediate climbing or descending need. Then exiting vehicles may wait to enter traffic flow at approximately roadway level.
- c. Within the limits of curve radii, no drop curb shall be allowed except as required for curb cut ramps.

C. Traffic Control Devices

- 1. The installation of signs and pavement markings at private roadways and residential or commercial driveways, and the installation of traffic signals at high-volume commercial Type III driveways may be required in order to provide for safe and efficient movement of traffic. All traffic control devices shall be installed in accordance with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) and the current County standards and specifications and shall be approved by the County Public Works Department, Traffic Section.
- 2. The approval to install traffic signals shall be based on a traffic engineering study which addresses the warrants, the design, and the operation of the signals. The study and design shall be approved by the County Public Works Department, Traffic Section and FDOT, if on the State Highway System. The responsibility for the engineering study shall rest with the permittee. If a traffic signal is installed, all signal elements and appropriate portions of the access approach to assure efficient signal operation, shall be on public right-of-way or on easements granted to the public.
- 3. Any required traffic control devices, including signs, signals or pavement markings shall be installed by the permittee. The permittee shall be responsible for all purchase and installation costs involved.

D. Auxiliary Lanes

Auxiliary Lanes refer to left-turn, right-turn, acceleration, deceleration, and storage lanes. Developments which generate AM or PM Peak Hour Traffic which exceeds the following thresholds shall provide the following site related acceleration, deceleration, and storage lanes:

- 1. If more than 20 left turning vehicles per hour on a two-lane arterial or collector roadway, then left turn lanes are warranted,
- 2. If more than 50 right turning vehicles per hour on a two-lane arterial or collector roadway, then right turn lanes are warranted,
- 3. If more than 40 right turning vehicles per hour, on a four-lane rural roadway, then a right turn lane is warranted,
- 4. If more than 80 right turning vehicles per hour, on a four-lane urban roadway, then a right turn lane is warranted,
- 5. If more than 60 right turning vehicles per hour, on a six-lane rural roadway, then a right turn lane is warranted,
- 6. If more than 100 right turning vehicles per hour, on a six-lane urban roadway, then a right turn lane is warranted,
- 7. On multi-lane roadways, left turn lanes shall be constructed when there are more than 20 left turning vehicles.

Sidewalk – Existing sidewalk on the east side of the roadway.

The request is to waive the requirement to improve Sunlake Boulevard (between the project access and Lutz Lake Fern Road) to current County TS-6 standards, the standards for which are found within the Hillsborough County Transportation Technical Manual. The specific waivers are as follows:

- 1. Type F curb along the median and edge of pavement

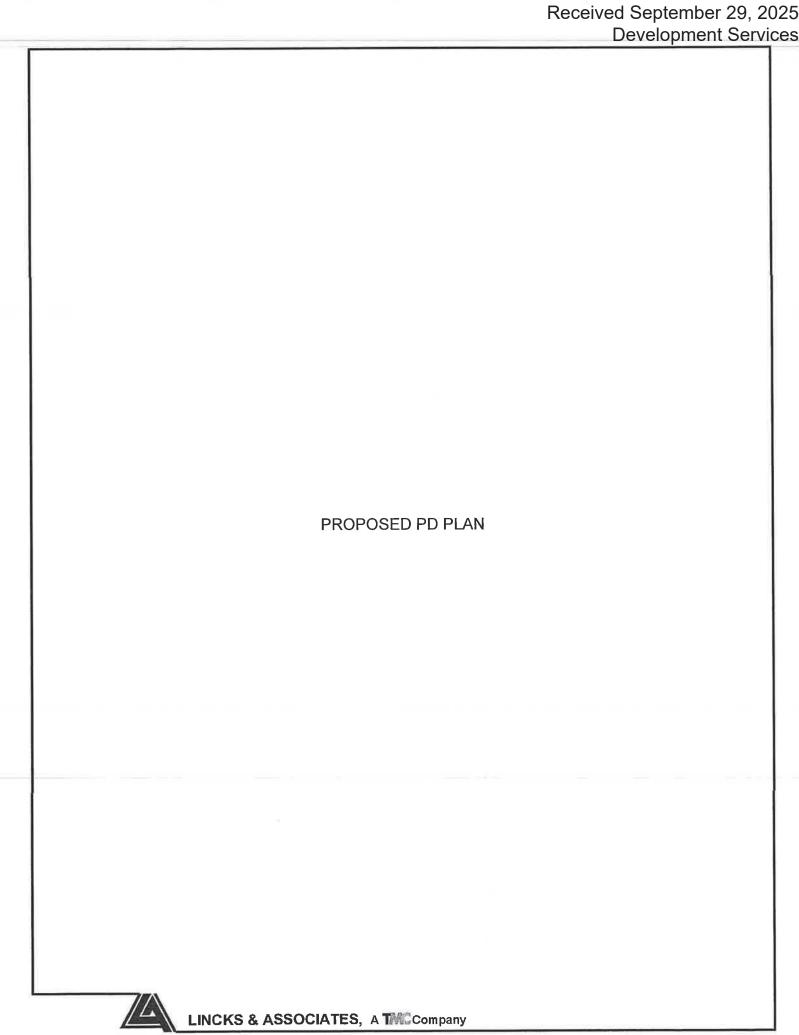

The developer proposed to add sidewalk along Sunlake Boulevard from Lutz Lake Fern Road to tie into the existing sidewalk to the south. With the sidewalk being added, the variance would not be detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare.

(c) without the variance, reasonable access cannot be provided. In the evaluation of the variance request, the issuing authority shall give valid consideration to the land use plans, policies, and local traffic circulation/operation of the site and adjacent areas.

Sunlake Boulevard is the only direct access for the project. Without the access to Sunlake Boulevard, reasonable access for the project could not be provided.

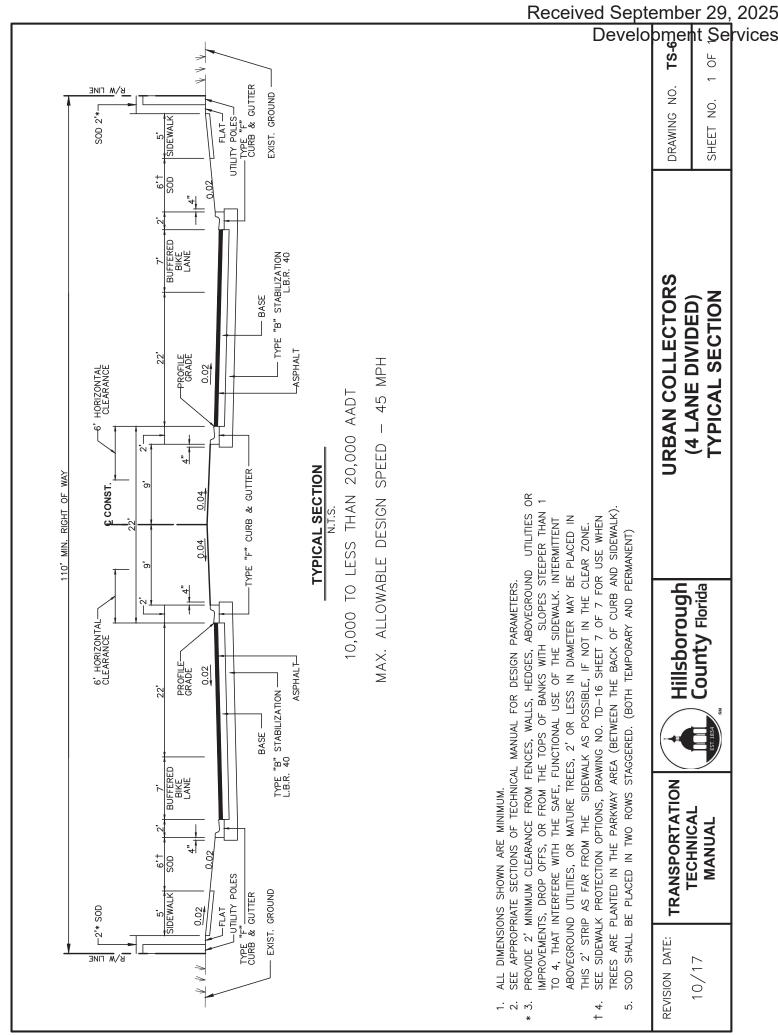

Staff Analysis of Goals, Objectives, and Policies:

The 1.11 ± acre subject site is south of Lutz Lake Fern Road West and east of Sunlake Boulevard and Dale Mabry Highway. The site is in the Urban Service Area (USA) and is located within the limits of the Lutz Community Plan. The applicant is requesting to rezone the site from Agricultural, Single Family Conventional (ASC-1) to Planned Development (PD) to allow office and commercial development. Specifically, the proposed uses are office (business and professional), office (medical), retail, personal services, restaurant (sit down only, no drive-thru).

The subject site is in the Urban Service Area where, according to Objective 1.1 of the Future Land Use Section (FLUS), 80 percent of the county's growth is to be directed. FLUS Policy 3.1.3 requires all new developments to be compatible with the surrounding area, noting that "Compatibility does not mean 'the same as.' Rather, it refers to the sensitivity of development proposals in maintaining the character of existing development." The intersection of Lutz Lake Fern Road and Sunlake Boulevard has multiple light commercial uses that continue along Sunlake Boulevard to Dale Mabry Highway. Towards the western and eastern areas of the Lutz Lake Fern Road and Sunlake Boulevard intersection, there are single-family and public/quasi-public/institutional uses, with single-family being the predominant land use. The location of the proposed commercial use orients the use into the existing pocket of light commercial uses along Sunlake Boulevard and Lutz Lake Fern Road. The proposed commercial use is adjacent to an assisted living facility to the south and a residential use to the west; however, there is a stormwater retention pond on the western boundary that provides additional buffering and screening from the proposed

commercial use and existing residential. Furthermore, the site plan shows cross access with the Assisted Living Facility (ALF) to the south of the site to promote access to the commercial development for the ALF residents and employees. The applicant has included a request to reduce use-to-use buffer from a 20-foot buffer with Type B screening to a 6-foot buffer with perimeter landscaping. Even with the reduction in buffering, the proposed site plan is compatible given the existing stormwater pond that abuts the western property line and provides adequate buffering and screening from the proposed use to the existing residential.

The proposed non-residential uses meet Commercial Locational Criteria, as outlined in FLUS Objective 4.7 and its associated policies, as it is located on the corner and within the required 1,000 feet of the qualifying intersection of Lutz Lake Fern Road and Sunlake Boulevard.

Additionally, the proposal meets the intent of the Neighborhood Protection policies in the Future Land Use Section (FLUS) under Objective 4.4 that requires new development to be compatible with the surrounding neighborhood (FLUS Policies 4.4.1 and 4.8.1). The proposed rezoning is compatible with the surrounding area and the non-residential development is located external to the established residential neighborhood and accessed via a collector roadway per FLUS Policy 4.8.1.

FLUS Goal 2 and FLUS Objective 2.1, and each of their respective policies, establish the Future Land Use Map (FLUM) as well as the allowable range of uses for each Future Land Use category. The character of each land use category is defined by building type, residential density, functional use, and the physical composition of the land. The integration of these factors sets the general atmosphere and character of each land use category. Each category has a range of potentially permissible uses, which are not exhaustive, but are intended to be illustrative of the character of uses permitted within the land use designation. The Residential-6 Future Land Use category allows for the consideration of up to 0.25 Floor Area Ratio (FAR). With 1.1 acres, the subject site can be considered for up to 11,979 square feet (1.1 acres x 43,560 square feet = 47,916 x 0.25 = 11,979 square feet). The applicant has proposed any combination of uses that will not exceed the allowable maximum intensity, which is consistent with FLUS Objective 2.1 as well as FLUS Table 2.2 The applicant is proposing to further restrict the intensity by proposing a condition of approval that states "No development shall be permitted that causes the cumulative development to exceed 657 gross average daily trips, 43 gross AM peak hour trips, or 89 gross PM peak hour trips." The proposal meets the requirements of Objective 2.1 and its accompanying policies as well as the criteria for the RES-6 Future Land Use category.

The Comprehensive Plan requires that all development meet or exceed the land development regulations in Hillsborough County (FLUS Policy 4.1.1, 4.1.2, and 4.1.6). However, at the time of uploading this report, Hillsborough County Development Services Department and Transportation Division comments were not yet available in Optix and thus were not taken into consideration for analysis of this request.

FLUS Objective 3.2 and Policy 3.2.4 require community plans throughout the county to be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan. The site is within the limits of the Lutz Community Plan. The Commercial Character strategy of this seeks to retain existing and encourage new commercial uses geared to serving the daily needs of area residents in a scale and design that complements the character of the community. While the strategy encourages new commercial development to locate at the three existing activity nodes along U.S. Highway 41, it does not prohibit commercial uses that meet Commercial Locational Criteria and are compatible with the surrounding neighborhood located outside of these nodes. The proposed Planned Development meets the intent of the strategies in the Lutz Community Plan.

Overall, staff finds that the proposed commercial development is compatible with the existing development pattern found within the surrounding area and supports the vision of the Lutz Community Plan. The proposed Planned Development would allow for development that is consistent with the Goals, Objectives and Policies of the *Unincorporated Hillsborough County Comprehensive Plan*.

Recommendation

Based upon the above considerations and the following Goals, Objectives and Policies, Planning Commission staff finds the proposed Planned Development **CONSISTENT** with the *Unincorporated Hillsborough County Comprehensive Plan*, subject to the conditions proposed by the Development Services Department.

Staff Identified Goals, Objectives and Policies of the *Unincorporated Hillsborough County Comprehensive Plan* Related to the Request:

FUTURE LAND USE SECTION

Urban Service Area

Objective 1.1: Direct at least 80% of new population growth into the USA and adopted Urban expansion areas through 2045. Building permit activity and other similar measures will be used to evaluate this objective.

Land Use Categories

Goal 2: Ensure that the character, compatibility and location of land uses optimize the combined potential for economic benefit, fiscal sustainability, protection of natural resources and maintaining viable agriculture. Ensure density and intensities are maintained through the Future Land Use Map.

Objective 2.1: The Future Land Use Map is a regulatory tool governing the pattern of development in unincorporated Hillsborough County through the year 2045.

Policy 2.1.1: The Future Land Use Map shall identify Future Land Use categories, summarized in Table 2.2 and further described in Appendix A, that establish permitted land uses and maximum densities and intensities.

Objective 2.2: The Future Land Use Map (FLUM) Shall identify Land Use Categories, summarized in table 2.2 of the Future Land Use Element.

Policy 2.2.1: The character of each land use category is defined by building type, residential density, functional use, and the physical composition of the land. The integration of these factors sets the general atmosphere and character of each land use category. Each category has a range of potentially permissible uses which are not exhaustive, but are intended to be illustrative of the character of uses permitted within the land use designation. Not all of those potential uses are routinely acceptable anywhere within that land use category.

Community Context and Compatibility

Policy 3.1.3: Compatibility is defined as the characteristics of different uses or activities or design which allow them to be located near or adjacent to each other in harmony. Some elements affecting compatibility include the following: height, scale, mass and bulk of structures, pedestrian or vehicular traffic, circulation, access and parking impacts, landscaping, lighting, noise, odor and architecture. Compatibility does not mean "the same as." Rather, it refers to the sensitivity of development proposals in maintaining the character of existing development.

Objective 3.2: Hillsborough County is comprised of many diverse communities and neighborhoods. The comprehensive plan is effective in providing an overall growth management strategy for development within the entire County. Strategies shall be developed that ensure the long-range viability of its communities through a community and special area studies planning effort.

Relationship to Land Development Regulations

Policy 3.2.4: The County shall assist the Hillsborough County City-County Planning Commission in developing community plans for each planning area that are consistent with and further the Goals, Objectives and Policies of the Comprehensive Plan. The community plans will be adopted as part of the Comprehensive Plan in the Livable Communities Element. These community specific policies will apply in guiding the development of the community. Additional policies regarding community planning and the adopted community plans can be found in the Livable Communities Element

Development

Objective 4.1: All existing and future land development regulations shall be made consistent with the Comprehensive Plan, and all development approvals shall be consistent with those development regulations as per the timeframe provided for within Chapter 163, Florida Statutes. Whenever feasible and consistent with Comprehensive Plan policies, land development regulations shall be designed to provide flexible, alternative solutions to problems.

Policy 4.1.1: Each land use plan category shall have a set of zoning districts that may be permitted within that land use plan category, and development shall not be approved for zoning that is inconsistent with the plan.

Policy 4.1.2: Developments must meet or exceed the requirements of all land development regulations as established and adopted by Hillsborough County, the state of Florida and the federal government unless such requirements have been previously waived by those governmental bodies.

Policy 4.1.6: Existing and future land development regulations shall be made consistent with the Comprehensive Plan, and all development approvals shall be consistent with those development regulations per the timeframe provided for within Chapter 163, Florida Statutes. Whenever feasible and consistent with Comprehensive Plan policies, land development regulations shall be designed to provide flexible, alternative solutions to problems.

Neighborhood and Community Development

Objective 4.4: Neighborhood Protection – Enhance and preserve existing neighborhoods and communities. Design neighborhoods which are related to the predominant character of their surroundings.

Policy 4.4.1: Any density or intensity increases shall be compatible with existing, proposed or planned surrounding development. Development and redevelopment shall beintegrated with the adjacent land uses through:

- a) the creation of like uses; and
- b) creation of complementary uses; and
- c) mitigation of adverse impacts; and
- d) transportation/pedestrian connections; and
- e) Gradual transitions of intensity

Policy 4.8.1: High-intensity non-residential development shall be located external to emerging and established residential neighborhoods and accessed on arterial or collector roadways.

LIVABLE COMMUNITIES ELEMENT: LUTZ COMMUNITY PLAN

Commercial Character Strategy: The Lutz community desires to retain existing and encourage new commercial uses geared to serving the daily needs of area residents in a scale and design that complements the character of the community.
